Gold Coast Aquatic Centre

The Gold Coast Aquatic Centre project is the redevelopment of the original Southport Pool established in the 1960s.

The aquatic centre is being upgraded to accommodate the 2014 Pan Pacific Swimming Championships and the Gold Coast 2018 Commonwealth Games™.


Facilities are being expanded to include a 50 metre 10 lane competition pool, training pool, program pool, diving pool, learn-to-swim pool and children's play pool.

Additional facilities include gymnasium, dry dive facility, community meeting rooms, spectator concourse and approximately 1000 permanent spectator seats.

The project is a joint partnership between the City of Gold Coast and the Queensland Government.
